


## **LESSON PLAN 6**

Lesson Plan 6 – Protect your digital creation		
Duration: 45 minutes		
Aim	This lesson plan aims to show students what Copyright and intellectual property are. Students will learn the basics about copyright, they will reflect on how to protect their own creations and they will reflect on what is "legal" or not according to copyright and licenses.
