Topic 1 Title: Types of information sources and services			
Lesson Plan 1 – In search of information			
Duration: 90 minutes			
Aim	The main goal of this lesson plan is to understand the topic of "source of information" and to put it into practice in everyday life.

Main Tasks	 Start of the meeting: presenting the topic and the way of work - presentations, discussions, workshop work (5 mins) Task 1: What sources of information do we use? (15 mins) 		





Information reaches us through various channels. They have a significant impact on our knowledge about the world, everyday life, worldview and, consequently, our decisions. It is important to use information from reliable sources and check its credibility. It's important to learn how to choose the right source. Remember that there is no completely objective source of information.

1.1 Participants receive sticky notes and write the sources of information they use - each sticky note is one source.

The coach creates the rays of the sun on the white board- groups repeated answers, e.g. books, press, media, Internet, encyclopedias, other people's knowledge, movies, podcasts etc.

1.2 Discussion: Are there sources of information that are not included here? Which we don't use, but can we? Or why do we use some of them less often? Participants receive glossaries *(see Handout 1)* with the division and definition of sources.

Summary: Throughout our lives, we have learned to reach for reliable sources of information. We often limit ourselves to those that have proven themselves many times over. It happens that we do not make an effort to expand these strategies.

- 3. Task 2: We are building a model of searching for information (20 mins)
- 2.1. The participants, divided into pairs, receive sentences that they form in a logical path of searching for information (see Handout 2)
- 2.2. Summary: overview of Big6 Information literacy model *(see Handout 3)*

Usually, we obtain knowledge and information according to the steps arranged. We may not be aware of this. Each stage is necessary to ensure that the information we obtain is satisfactory for us.

- 4. Task 3: The information search model in practice (25 mins)
- 3.1 We divide the participants into 3 groups. Participants receive worksheets (see Handout 4).

Answer the questions:

- What information do you need?
- Find 2 sources from each category: books, websites, electronic publications (e.g. film, presentation)





What you need: a computer with Internet access, books and newspapers can be brought.

- 5. Task 4: Which source of information fits best? (15 mins)
- 4.1. Participants receive a card with a table containing 3 categories (<u>see Handout 5</u>): study/work, interests, entertainment. Their task is to assign entries to the appropriate category they try to answer the question which source will be the best to search for knowledge in a given category.
 - 6. Task 5: Wrap up (10 mins)



HANDOUT 1: Types of information sources and services

 Documentary - "A material object containing recorded information intended to be transmitted in time and space".

Original document

Definition: It is a product of human thought and "has the form in which the author prepared and predicted it."

Secondary document

Definition: "It is prepared from the original or a derivative document and reflects its full and unchanging features in terms of content and often form" (photo, photocopy, scan of the original document).

Derivative document

Definition: "Prepared from a primary or secondary document by elaboration according to certain rules and provides information about the primary document and its content. Derivative documents are also called information tools." - i.e. bibliographies, issue files.

- 2. Non-documentary "Organizations and information systems, personal contacts, conversations, lectures at conferences and congresses, lectures at courses, training, lessons, observations and observations, radio messages, TV images, etc. The basic feature is the fact that the information transmitted is not materially recorded in any form, but passes directly from the source of the information to its recipient."
 - Non-documentary team (the teacher points to conferences, lectures, conventions, fairs, symposia),
 - Undocumented individual (lists personal contacts, conversations here).
